An example of a program dedicated to helping the poor and vulnerable is sponsored by the National Conference of Bishops of Brazil. This program, called Pastoral da Criança, or Pastoral of the Child, helps prevent infant deaths and provides nutrition information, medical care, and education to poor families in Brazil. Many School Sisters of Notre Dame are involved in this program, which serves more than a million families a month. It was nominated for a Nobel Peace Prize in 2001.

Focus on Faith

Blessed Frederic Ozanam (1813–1853) was a Catholic layman in France. In 1832 an epidemic of cholera swept through Paris, killing up to 1,200 people each day. As Frederic walked through the poorer suburbs on his way to the university, he was deeply moved at the hopeless state of families who had lost fathers and mothers. He and six friends decided to see what they could do. They began by giving a widow the remainder of their winter wood supply. Frederic and his friends continued their work. Eventually they formed an association and called it The Society of St. Vincent de Paul. Today the society they began has some 55,000 members in the United States and 1,000,000 worldwide in 130 countries.
