Edward Fenwick was an English Dominican priest who came to the United States in 1804. In 1807 Charles Carroll, the first American bishop. sent him to Kentucky. where he founded the first Congregation of Dominican men, St. Rose Priory. On Easter Sunday, April 7, 1922, nine young women from St. Rose parish made their vows as Dominicans. They were the first Dominican women in the United States.

Models for Our Children

Children enjoy stories of good kings, brave knights, and noble ladies. Often they have to find these heroes in fiction. A notable exception is Saint Louis IX, king of France in the 1200s. Louis IX took his Christian responsibilities seriously. As king, he made laws that protected the people from the unfair treatment of nobles and court officials. He worked for peace in his kingdom and was a mediator in disputes in surrounding lands. Louis IX and his wife, Queen Margaret, were happily married and the parents of 11 children. Louis died while on a Crusade in North Africa. His life story has all the elements of intrigue, adventure, and chivalry, so it will inspire our children to direct their lives to God.

Share with your child the story of the saint that most inspires you. Ask your child about his or her favorite saint and what your child admires about that saint's life.
