#### **Dinnertime Conversation Starter**

We can make covenants within the family, promises to support one another in important ways. Identify with your family a promise that each can make to support the family during the next week.

End your family conversation with a prayer and a pledge to ask God for help in keeping the promises made.

#### Hints for at Home

Begin a habit in your family called the "Lord, have mercy moment." Whenever someone is having trouble, any person in the family can say, "Lord, have mercy!" When someone is frustrated or sad, it's all right to ask whether this is a "Lord, have mercy moment." Sometimes it may even be appropriate to stop and pray the Hail Mary or some other short prayer, asking for God's help. A humorous version of this is a "Mom, have mercy" or "Dad,



have mercy" moment. One of these expressions can be used when a child has made a mistake, forgotten instructions, or spilled the milk. By using a "Mom" or "Dad" version, your child can relate God's love to a parent's love.
